The Office of Special Education (OSE) is a service-oriented office that seeks to improve the education experience for children with disabilities. In keeping with the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) and State law, we help local schools and districts provide effective educational programs to students with disabilities, ages 3-20, who need special education and related services.

The OSE ensures that local school districts in Mississippi have special education programs, policies, and procedures that comply with the Federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) and its implementing regulations, and that eligible children and youth with disabilities receive a Free Appropriate Public Education (FAPE). The OSE also provides professional learning opportunities, provides technical assistance to schools, supports the needs of families of students with disabilities, monitors schools for student outcomes and compliance with the regulations of the IDEA, and administers the IDEA entitlement grant.

Teletherapy Needs Assessment

A needs assessment is best accomplished in collaboration with key school district employees, including the information technology coordinator or technician, the special education director, the SLP, and, if possible, a classroom teacher.





School-Based Telepractice Needs Assessment

Category	Needs	Challenges	Associated cost?	Solutions		
Infrastructure & equipment						
1. What room/space is available for initiating and receiving telepractice services? 2. Are the room characteristics adequate at each site? (consider is there a door, internet and phone connections, working electrical outlets, adequate lighting, room acoustics, handicap accessibility, proximity to printer, scanner, fax machine) 3. What equipment is needed? (Consider dedicated videoconferencing equipment, computer, wide screen monitor, web camera, document camera, headsets, microphone, audio splitter, scanner, printer, fax, telephone, desk, table, chairs) 4. What equipment is already available? 5. Is there adequate internet access? (consider available bandwidth during peak usage, firewalls that must be reconfigured to allow telepractice, availability of hardwire vs. wireless access)						
Personnel & training						
 Do you have SLP(s) with required state credentials? Do you have a paraprofessional to assist at the student site? What are the roles and responsibilities for the SLP and the paraprofessional in telepractice? How will these roles and responsibilities be communicated to the SLP and paraprofessional? 						




- Year-round IEPs are allowed






Mental Health Resources
