

## Title I, Part A Allowable Uses

#### **Use of this Document**

This document is designed to support local education agencies (LEAs), schools, and sub-grantees in identifying potential allowable uses of Title I, Part A funds. It is important to note that while this document lists strategies and activities commonly funded, this should not be considered an exhaustive list, nor does it guarantee that an activity listed will be considered allowable for each sub-grantee; allowability is also based on a data-driven assessment of local needs.

## **Purpose of Title I, Part A**

The purpose of Title I, Part A is to provide all children significant opportunity to receive a fair, equitable, and high-quality education, and to close educational achievement gaps. Title I, Part A funds may be used for children from preschool through grade 12. LEAs target the Title I fund they receive to public schools with the highest poverty rates. Public schools with poverty rates of at least 40 percent may use Title I, Part A funds, along with other federal, state, and local funds, to operate a schoolwide program to upgrade the entire educational program. Schools with poverty rates below 40 percent, or those choosing not to operate a schoolwide program, offer a targeted assistance program. In a targeted assistance program, the school serves Title I-eligible students who are failing, or most at risk of failing, to meet challenging state academic standards. The school then designs, in consultation with parents, staff, and district staff, an instructional program to meet the needs of those students. Both schoolwide and targeted assistance programs must be based on effective means of improving student achievement and include strategies to support parent and family engagement.

### **General Considerations**

Programs and activities supported by Title I funds must:

- Be consistent with the purpose of Title I, Part A.
- Be necessary, addressing identified needs on the Local Education Agency (LEA)'s Comprehensive Needs Assessment (CNA) and supportgoals outlined on the LEA's Schoolwide Plan
- Be reasonable, considering breadth of impact and associated costs
- Address the learning needs of all students, including children with disabilities, English Learners (ELs), Homeless, and gifted and talented students
- Be utilized to supplement local and state funds, not supplant them; and
- Be coordinated with other available funds and resources to maximize the effectiveness and efficiency of spending
