03. <u>Action: Approval by the SBE to suspend strict compliance with specific state statutes, State Board of Education policies, manuals, and process standards for the 2020 – 2021 school year following Governor Tate Reeves' Proclamation of a State of Emergency as a result of the impact of COVID-19 (coronavirus) on school districts in accordance with Miss. Code Ann. § 33-15-31, 33-15-11(b)(9) and 33-15-11(c)(1) [Goals 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6 – MBE Strategic Plan]</u>

President Donald Trump declared a national emergency on March 13, 2020, in response to the COVID-19 (coronavirus) outbreak. On March 14, 2020, Governor Tate Reeves issued a Declaration of a State of Emergency for the state of Mississippi. Included in his Proclamation, Governor Reeves directed that pursuant to Miss. Code Ann. § 33-15-11(c), the provisions of state statutes, rules, regulations or orders may be temporarily suspended or modified if compliance with such provisions would prevent, hinder, or delay action to cope with the outbreak. On March 19, 2020, Governor Reeves issued Executive Order 1460, and on April 22, 2020, Governor Reeves issued Executive Order 1476, which in accordance with Miss. Code Ann. §§ 33-15-31, 33-15-11(b)(9) and 33-15-11(c)(1), authorizes and empowers the State Board of Education to suspend the provisions of any regulatory statutes, and to make, amend, rescind such orders, rules and regulations that it deems necessary to assist Mississippi public schools to cope with the COVID-19 emergency.

Due to the unprecedented and unique circumstances arising because of COVID-19, such as statewide school closures that occurred during the latter portion of the 2019 – 2020 school year and throughout the 2020 – 2021 school year, it is not economically feasible or practical to expect districts and schools to meet specific policies and process standards in the *Mississippi Public School Accountability Standards, 2020* and *Mississippi Nonpublic School Accountability Standards,* 2020.

Throughout the Spring and Fall of 2020 the SBE approved multiple waivers, rule suspensions, and deadline extensions as a result of the impact of COVID-19 (coronavirus) on school districts during the 2019 – 2020 and 2020 – 2021 school years. Among those included waivers to allow school districts to operate for less than 180 days, to suspend the administration of all statewide assessments required by state and federal law for the 2019 – 2020 school year, to suspend the Mississippi Statewide Accountability System for the 2019 – 2020 school year, and the submission and approval of a waiver request to the United States Department of Education (ED) as provided for in the Elementary and Secondary Education Act

(ESEA). The SBE also granted additional waivers, rule suspensions, and deadline extensions of multiple state laws, SBE policies, and process standards for the 2019 – 2020 and 2020 – 2021 school years as a result of the impact of COVID-19 to allow districts flexibility with the development of re-entry plans and class scheduling for the 2020 – 2021 school year. This flexibility allowed districts to comply with the current Mississippi State Department of Health (MSDH) and the Center for Disease Control (CDC) guidelines related to COVID-19 to ensure the health and safety of all staff and students.

ED has not issued a waiver of assessment requirements for the 2020 - 2021 school year. All state and federal assessments will be administered during the 2020 - 2021 school year. However, due to the ongoing impact of COVID-19 during the 2020 - 2021 school year, the MDE is recommending the SBE suspend strict compliance with additional state statutes State Board of Education policies, manuals, and process standards for the 2020 - 2021 school year as outlined in items 3A, 3B, 3C, 3D, and 3E.

To ensure districts are aware of their continued responsibilities, the MDE will provide additional guidance to districts regarding the approval and parameters of any waivers and suspensions approved by the SBE for the 2020 – 2021 school year.

This item references Goals 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6 of the *Mississippi Board of Education* 2018 – 2022 Strategic Plan.

All state and federal assessments within the Mississippi Statewide Assessment System will be administered during the 2020 - 2021 school year. However, the MDE will not have sufficient data to produce the accountability determinations as required by state and federal law for the 2020 - 2021 school year.

Upon State Board of Education approval the MDE will submit an Addendum to the ESEA Consolidated State Plan and an accompanying waiver request for the identification of Comprehensive Support and Improvement Schools (CSI), Targeted Support and Improvement Schools (TSI), and Additional Targeted Support and Improvement Schools (ATSI) timelines for identification for school in school improvement, long-term goals for English language proficiency (ELP) and the ELP indicator, and the assignment of A – F letter grades for the 2020 – 2021 school year.

Proficiency rates will be calculated and reported for Reading and Mathematics to the extent possible based on the administration of all statewide assessments administered during the 2020 – 2021 school year and the current business rules of the Mississippi Statewide Accountability System.

It is the recommendation of the MDE that the SBE suspend strict compliance with specific requirements within the following state statutes, or policies, manuals, and process standards for the 2020 – 2021 school year:

- Mississippi Statewide Accountability System: Miss. Code Ann. § 37-17-6(5)
- Miss. Admin. Code 7-24: *Mississippi Public School Accountability Standards*, 2020

Approval by the SBE to suspend strict compliance with specific state statutes, State Board of Education policies, manuals, and process standards for the 2020 – 2021 school year as it relates to 3rd Grade English Language Arts/Reading Assessment, following Governor Tate Reeves' Proclamation of a State of Emergency as a result of the impact of COVID-19 (coronavirus) on school districts in accordance with Miss. Code Ann. § 33-15-31, 33-15-11(b)(9) and 33-15-11(c)(1) [Goals 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6 – MBE Strategic Plan]

All state and federal assessments within the Mississippi Statewide Assessment System will be administered during the 2020 – 2021 school year.

The MDE is recommending that all eligible students take the 3rd Grade English Language Arts/Reading assessment but not be required to meet a passing score to be promoted to the 4th Grade.

It is the recommendation of the MDE that the SBE suspend strict compliance with specific requirements within the following state statutes, or policies, manuals, and process standards for the 2020 – 2021 school year:

Approval by the SBE to suspend strict compliance with specific state statutes, State Board of Education policies, manuals, and process standards for the 2020 – 2021 school year as it relates to the End-of-Course Subject Areas Tests, following Governor Tate Reeves' Proclamation of a State of Emergency as a result of the impact of COVID-19 (coronavirus) on school districts in accordance with Miss. Code Ann. § 33-15-31, 33-15-11(b)(9) and 33-15-11(c)(1) [Goals 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6 – MBE Strategic Plan]

All state and federal assessments within the Mississippi Statewide Assessment System will be administered during the 2020 – 2021 school year.

The MDE is recommending that all eligible students take End-of-Course Subject Areas Tests, but not be required to meet a passing score to meet high school graduation requirements.

It is the recommendation of the MDE that the SBE suspend strict compliance with specific requirement within the following State Board of Education polices, manuals, and process standards for the 2020 – 2021 school year:

Approval by the SBE to suspend strict compliance with specific state statutes, State Board of Education policies, manuals, and process standards for the 2020 – 2021 school year as it relates to submission of the FY 2020 Single Audit reporting package, following Governor Tate Reeves' Proclamation of a State of Emergency as a result of the impact of COVID-19 (coronavirus) on school districts in accordance with Miss. Code Ann. § 33-15-31, 33-15-11(b)(9) and 33-15-11(c)(1) [Goals 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6 – MBE Strategic Plan]

In December 2020, the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) authorized recipients and subrecipients that received COVID-19 funding with original due dates from October 1, 2020, through June 30, 2021, an extension for up to three (3) months beyond the normal due date in the completion and submission of the FY 2020 Single Audit reporting package. Therefore, the MDE is requesting a temporary suspension of the deadline set in Process Standard 4 to extend the deadline by three (3) months to reflect OMB's extension (June 30, 2021) for the Fiscal Year 2020 audits.

It is the recommendation of the MDE that the SBE suspend strict compliance with specific requirement within the following State Board of Education polices, manuals, and process standards for the 2020 – 2021 school year:

Approval by the SBE to suspend strict compliance with specific state statutes, State Board of Education policies, manuals, and process standards for the 2020 – 2021 school year as it relates to the required training for MCOPS recipients and SROs, following Governor Tate Reeves' Proclamation of a State of Emergency as a result of the impact of COVID-19 (coronavirus) on school districts in accordance with Miss. Code Ann. § 33-15-31, 33-15-11(b)(9) and 33-15-11(c)(1) [Goals 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6 – MBE Strategic Plan]

Due to the ongoing impact of COVID-19 on training opportunities during the 2020 – 2021 school year, the MDE is requesting an extension of the June 30, 2021 deadline until December 31, 2021, for the submission of the annual 40 hours of training for FY 2022 Mississippi Community Oriented Policing Services in Schools (MCOPS) grant recipients and School Resource Officers (SROs) employed with school districts that created their own police departments.
