Lesson Measurable Learning Objectives

The student will complete a job shadow experience with specific school personnel and write a three paragraph reflective summary of the experience.

Lesson Formative Assessment (acceptable evidence):

Assessment should relate to the performance outcome for goals and objectives. Assessment can be question answer, performance activity, etc.

Upon completion of the job shadowing experience, students will write a three paragraph summary of the experience which will include: A description of the overall experience, a description of the skills utilized during the experience, and an explanation of the positive and negative aspects of the job they experienced. After the students complete the reflection piece, the student will compose a thank you note to the person he or she job shadowed.

Their reflection will include a description of the overall experience, a description of the skills utilized during the experience, and an explanation of the positive and negative aspects of the job they experienced.	1. 2.	Ask the students to share with a partner one thing he or she learned during the job shadowing experience.	2.	Each student shares one thing he or she learned during the job shadowing experience.		
3.	. Ask students to turn to another person and share one skill he or she used during the job shadow experience and/or one skill he or she observed the worker use during the job shadow experience.		 Each student shares one skill he or she used or observed during the job shadow experience. 		
4.	Students use the <i>Thank you Activity Sheet</i> to write a thank you note to the person that was job shadowed.	4.	Students write thank you notes to the school staff member he or she job shadowed.		
5.	Arrange for delivery of thank you notes to the appropriate people by students or you.
