



#### Flip That Role

- "Tell me and I forget, show me and I remember, <u>involve</u> me and I understand."
- In the book: *Understanding by Design (UbD)*, authors make a call for educators to reflect on how they balance the following three teaching roles:
  - Facilitation: open-ended questioning, problem posing, Socratic seminar, and guided inquiry
  - Direct instruction: demonstration, modeling, and lecturing
  - Coaching: providing feedback, conferencing, and guided practice
    - Credit: Grant Wiggins and Jay McTighe

## Strategy 1: Essential Questions and Inquiry Units

- Student Centered classrooms often begin with a question
- The teacher is the facilitator
- The student is "the owner" of the learning
- Student moves to center stage and teacher assumes a supporting role
- Inquiry can be a powerful teacher

#### Student Centered Questions: The Ingredients

- (1) The question should be interesting and compelling to your students right now!
- (2) It should invite them into the ongoing disciplinary debates and conversations that create knowledge in the first place.
- (3) It should require students to learn—and to use—the same understandings and strategies as the real experts in the field.

#### Do What, Now? Inquiry Based Units...

- Ex: read a variety of informational and narrative texts and learn about the features of these texts; on topic of choice "STAMP OF APPROVAL"
- Compare what they have learned about topic in general and in specific cases. Real Life Application "Okay, I can hang with this."
- Create multimodal exhibits of habitats with labels of important features "ARE YOU KIDDING ME RIGHT NOW?"
- Try role-play, even viewing/arguing/speaking about the topic from the different perspectives and various life forms. "Um. No."
- REMEMBER: These are all strategies that are emphasized by the Common Core State Standards, from elementary through secondary school.







#### Strategy 2: Be the Fool

- They will be excited about what you are excited about
- Make your classroom a safe place to nerd it out
- Pick big umbrella themes that can incorporate many standards
- Create culminating events





## Strategy 3: Morning Meeting

- Set the tone for respectful learning
- Establish a climate of trust
- Motivate students to feel significant
- Create empathy and encourage collaboration
- Support social, emotional and academic learning

- Consists of: greeting, sharing, group activity, and announcements
- Can be no longer than 15-25 minutes
- Include a response to a morning message (Problem of the Day, Journal Response, Daily Math/Language Review)
- Set learning goals (I can statements)
- Responsive classroom handout

#### Strategy 4: They Like Themselves More Than They Like You

- Let them teach themselves
- Give them scripts
- Have them record themselves using technology
- Ask them: What do you want to be an EXPERT on? What findings can you share from your research?



#### Strategy 5: Looks Like, Sounds Like, Feels Like

- Make a lesson with a specific learning goal/product
- What does the discussion need to sound like?
- What should NOT be present in the discussion?
- What does the product need to look like?
- What should I feel like (author, scientist, historian, mathematician)?
