"Cradles, cribs, and highchairs are furniture for babies. What do you notice?"	Show images. Children respond.		
"How is a <i>cradle</i> similar to or different from a <i>crib</i> ? The <i>curved</i> part is called a <i>rocker</i> . What do you notice?"	Children respond.		
"Rocking babies in cradles can soothe them when they are upset or help them fall asleep."			
"A <i>crib</i> has <i>slats</i> on the sides to keep a baby <i>safe</i> . When babies get older, those <i>rascals</i> can climb right out!"			
"Why do you think a <i>highchair</i> is designed like this?	Children respond.
