Let's Find Out About It:			
Preparation: Set up materials.			
"In <i>Peter's Chair</i> , Peter and his father bought supplies at the hardware store to paint Susie's chair."	Show illustrations.		
"Here are images of <i>hardware</i> stores. What do you notice?"	Show Images. Children Respond.		
"A <i>hardware</i> store sells paint, like Peter and his father needed, but also <i>tools</i> - things that help people do work. You can buy big <i>tools</i> like rakes and shovels, and smaller <i>tools</i> like screws and nails. What do you notice?"	Show tools.		
"Clerks work at hardware stores. How do clerks help customers?"	Show images.		

Using this as a Provocation:

If appropriate, put tools from the hardware store in Science and Puzzles (Manipulatives) for children to explore and to strengthen fine motor abilities.

Ask children what items from a hardware store could be used to repair or maintain areas of the classroom (screwdrivers to tighten loose screws in tables, paint and paintbrush to paint the wall).
