Let's Find Out About It:

Preparation: Set up materials. Print instructions on page 2.

"In <i>Oonga Boonga</i> , when Daniel came back from school, he soothed Baby Louise. He was carrying a paper airplane. He might have followed <i>instructions</i> like in this book, <i>How to Make a Paper</i>	Show illustrations. Show book.
Airplane. What do you notice?"	Children respond.
"The author and illustrator is a girl named Samky. She created it when she was in preschool, just like you are now. She is an expert - she knows a lot about paper airplanes. How do you think she became an expert ?	Children respond.
She wrote the <i>procedure</i> - steps to follow-in her book"	Read book, modeling each step.
"How are Samky's <i>instructions</i> helpful to someone who is not an <i>expert</i> at making paper airplanes?"	Children respond.

Provocation:

Encourage children to write and illustrate their own expert/how-to books. Place these books along with Samky's book in Library and Listening.

Invite family members to share their expertise (family members who can demonstrate mechanics, cooking, crafting, etc.).
