Enduring Understanding(s):

- Color can be used to communicate ideas, thoughts, and feelings.
- Color can carry information.

Essential Question(s):

- How are colors used to communicate ideas, thoughts, and feelings?

Materials	Vocabulary	Books
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <i>Dog's Colorful Day</i> <i>Max's Dragon Shirt</i> dry erase board and markers permanent marker small container of water template of Dog with ear stain drawn in permanent marker (see Resource) 	<p>fur: soft hair on an animal</p> <p>permanent: will not come off</p> <p>stain: a mark that is difficult to remove</p> <p>washable: can be removed with soap and water</p>	

Let's Find Out About It:

Preparation: Set up materials. On a dry erase board, draw or use template of Dog. Draw "washable" stains with dry erase markers. Draw Dog's stain on ear in permanent marker.

"In <i>Dog's Colorful Day</i> , Dog's fur is white with one black spot on his left ear. What do you notice?"	Show illustrations. Children respond.
"Here is an image of Dog. Many things stained Dog's fur like _____. What happened when Dog had a bath?"	Show dry erase board with Dog template. "Stain" his fur with dry erase markers and erase them-giving Dog a bath. Children respond.
"Dog still has a black spot on his ear. The black spot is permanent - it won't come off - even if Dog's fur is washed many times."	
"The other stains on Dog - the green grass, blue paint, red jam spots - were all washable - they came off when Dog's fur got soapy and wet. How are the washable stains on Dog similar to or different from the stains on Max's dragon shirt?"	Show illustrations. Children respond.
