## Let's Find Out About It: Subway Route Colors

## Enduring Understanding(s):

• Color can carry information.

## **Essential Question(s):**

• How colors used to communicate ideas, thoughts, and feelings?

<ul> <li>Nana in the City</li> <li>New York subway map (see Resource)</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>map: shows us where we are and where we need to go</li> <li>route: a path</li> <li>subway: an underground train in a large city that carries people from place to place</li> </ul>	<ul><li>system: a group of related things that work together</li><li>train: a row of wheeled cars connected together</li></ul>	Nana Pres City City Control Control Co

Let's Find Out About It:			
Preparation: Set up materials.			
"In <i>Nana in the City</i> , the boy and his grandmother rode on the New York <b>subway</b> - a <b>train</b> under the city streets - to her apartment. What do you notice?"	Show illustrations. Children respond.		
"How are <b>subways</b> helpful to people in cities?"	Children respond.		
"In New York, the <b>subway</b> is part of a <b>system</b> - <b>trains</b> and buses that transport people – New Yorkers call this "the train" or "the Subway." Here is a <b>map</b> of a section of the New York <b>subway</b> . What do you notice?"	Show images. <b>Children respond.</b>		
"Each <b>route</b> - where the <b>train</b> travels - is a different color. The circles are the names of the places where the <b>train</b> stops."	Trace routes on the New York Subway map and point out stops and their names.		
"If we wanted to travel from our school to, how could we use a <b>map</b> to plan what <b>route</b> (s) to take?"	Point to a subway stop near the school and a destination. <b>Children respond.</b>
