

## Let's Find Out About It: Traffic Light \& Street Sign Colors

## Enduring Understanding(s):

- Color can be used to communicate ideas, thoughts, and feelings.


## Essential Question(s):

- How do you make your thinking and learning visible to other people?


## Materials

- Nana in the City
- traffic signal photos (see Resource)
- road signs - made or purchased - like block area signs


## Vocabulary

caution: careful; to avoid danger
construction site: a piece of land where a building is to be located
street signs: signs used to control traffic traffic lights: lights used to control traffic
warn: to tell of possible danger


## Let's Find Out About It:

## Preparation: Set up materials.

"We have been talking a lot about color. Today, we're going to talk about how color on traffic lights and street signs help us know what to do so we can be safe."

| "In Nana in the City, the boy sees his grandmother waving to him on <br> the corner of the street - right near a traffic light. The light must be <br> red because cars are stopped, and people are crossing the street <br> behind his grandmother." | Show illustrations <br> on pages 1-2. |
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| "Here is a traffic light. When the light is red, drivers stop their car. <br> Before the light turns red it is yellow. When a light is yellow it means <br> proceed with caution; a driver will need to prepare to stop. When the <br> light is green, the traffic can go." | Show photo/image <br> of traffic light. |
| "Another way to know to stop is a STOP sign that is red. Here a man <br> holds a STOP sign to stop traffic so people can cross the street." | Show illustration <br> on pages 5-6. |
| "Here Nana and the boy are in a noisy part of the city where these <br> orange cones warn people to stay away from a construction site. <br> Orange is another color that means caution, or slow down." | Show images. |
| "How are traffic lights and street signs helpful to people?" | Children respond. |
