

## Enduring Understanding(s):

- Colors can be mixed to make new colors.


## Essential Question(s):

- How do people honor and respect a diverse range of feelings, opinions, and identities?


## Materials

## Vocabulary

- Skin Again
- flag a couple of pages with illustrations showing different skin colors
- self-portrait images, from Week 3
- mirror
- chart paper, one piece
- paint, especially black, yellow, red, and white
- paintbrushes
- small trays, for mixing paints
- cup, for water
experiment: to test out in different ways
match: to make the same as
outline: a line showing the outside edge of something
self-portrait: an image of oneself
shade: the lightness or darkness of a color
skin tone: the color of a person's skin
tint: a lighter shade of a color, typically made by adding white



## Let's Find Out About It:

Preparation: Set up materials. Gather objects in a bin or basket. Post the chart paper for use in recording children's responses.
"Let's look one more time at some of the illustrations in Skin Again."
"What do you notice about the characters Chris Raschka has created?"
"What do you notice in these self-portraits about how the artists showed their skin tone?"

Show the flagged pages.

Show images. Children respond.

Invite children to turn and talk, reminding them to sit knee to knee and to take turns talking and listening. Circulate to listen in.

After a minute, bring the children back to the whole group, and ask a few children to share their observations. "You will use paint to create your self-portraits. For my own self-portrait, would I have the right color for my skin tone? It looks like I will need to experiment with paint mixing to create the tints and shades I need."

Model looking into the mirror and mixing paint to create an appropriate color for a self-portrait. Talk through adding various colors to create lighter and darker shades. Model adding just small amounts of paint (and perhaps show what happens when adding a large amount, especially of white or yellow). Demonstrate testing paint colors on the paper, and show that it will take time, patience, and experimentation to get the desired color.
"I think I finally created a match for my skin tone. I think I will name this color $\qquad$ . [Resist using only food as color names.] During Centers, you will have an opportunity to create your own skin tone paint color!"
