



Why this is IMPORTANT:

Taking moments each day to talk and read with your child strengthens their language and literacy skills. It is especially important to engage your child with meaningful interactions during daily routines as well as planned play activities. When you talk and engage with your child during play, mealtimes, bath, and bedtime routines, it strengthens the loving, trusting relationship between you and your child. Children gain language skills, literacy skills, and social and emotional skills when we read, talk, sing and interact with them throughout the day.

Language and Literacy Development

- * Read books with your infant or toddler daily, repeated exposure to words and labeling people and objects will help to foster their language development.
 - **Activity 1:** Count your child's toes while reciting "This Little Piggy" nursery rhyme.
 - **Activity 2:** Recite the rhyme, "Three Little Kittens" using gestures and voice inflection to excite and interest your child as he begins to learn the patterns of rhyming.

Mathematical Development

- ★ Math opportunities can be found all around. Talk and count items with your child during daily routines. For example, diapering, meal and bath times, and neighborhood walks.
 - Activity 1: Count rubber ducks or other small toys during bath time or play routines.
 - **Activity 2:** Take a teddy bear and name and count each part of the teddy bear. For example, "Look, the teddy bear has two ears, two eyes, one mouth, one tail etc...."

Social Emotional Development

- ★ The loving relationship you develop with your baby helps them to build trust, get their needs met, and learn to identify and regulate their emotions.
 - **Activity 1:** Take a small teddy bear or stuffed animal, a small cloth or blanket, and play peek-a-boo or "Where's the bear?" Cover the animal's face and say, "Where's the bear?" and let your child try to move the cloth to uncover the animal's face.
 - **Activity 2:** Sit together while looking at family photos and/or pet photos with your child and identity the family member. Discuss the feelings and reactions of your child or the people in the photos while looking at the pictures (smiling, laughing, surprised, etc.).

Scientific Development

- ★ Submit to your child's curiosity and natural exploration by allowing your child to explore and use their senses. Provide many opportunities for exploration and play indoors and outdoors throughout the day.
 - **Activity 1:** Save different sized containers and allow your child to play with them in the tub. Talk about which container has more and which container has less.
 - **Activity 2:** While reading a book about animals ask your child, "What sound does this animal make?" Verbally make the animal sounds and encourage your child to repeat the sounds.
