Mississippi School for Mathematics and Science

27. <u>Approval of the Mississippi School for Mathematics and Science (MSMS)</u> <u>Advisory Board appointments</u>

In 1987, the State Board of Education approved a set of "Operating Procedures for the Mississippi School for Mathematics and Science (MSMS)." A part of those procedures was to establish an "Advisory Board" comprised of eleven (11) members. The membership consists of a practicing public school secondary principal, a practicing public school superintendent, a practicing public school secondary counselor, a practicing public school elementary/middle level representative, a non-public/parochial school representative, an officer of the Mississippi Association for Gifted Children (MAGC), a parent of a MSMS junior student, and four (4) laypersons. Consideration in the selection of members shall be given to assure gender, ethnicity, and geographic representation. Each member will serve a term for three (3) years with the exception of the parent member who shall serve for the two (2) years that the child is enrolled at MSMS. Members may be reappointed for a single term. The membership of the advisory board shall be appointed by the State Board of Education upon recommendation of the State Superintendent of Education.

Personal History

I began my career in 1961 after graduating from High School in Oxford, MS. I joined the U.S. Army where I received training in telecommunications systems. Over the next four years while in the military, I spent time in Puerto Rico, Vietnam, and the Philippines. After my discharge in 1965, I was employed by a Washington based Company as a technical representative. My work there consisted of supporting the U.S. Army Defense Communication System in Vietnam and Taiwan.

I returned to the states in 1968 where I was employed by the GTE Corporation in Southern California. During my time with GTE, I completed my Associate's Degree in Engineering. I also attended night school at the University of Redlands, in Redlands, CA. There I obtained a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration Degree. In 1996 I retired from Cellular One Communications Center in Nashville, TN, where I spent a total of 28 years with the GTE Corporation as a Senior Communications Engineer.

My wife and I started a small delivery service in 1984 in Southern California, which we operated successfully for five years. We grew from one vehicle to ten during that period. This business was sold in 1990 after my GTE transfer from Southern California to Dallas, Texas. Upon my arrival in Dallas in 1991, we decided to open a beauty supply business back in my hometown of Oxford, MS. We built a successful business that we operated until December 1999.

In 1993, we established Nina Renee Cosmetics, a retail business that was based in Memphis, TN at the Southland Mall. This business featured our private labeled cosmetic products and accessories. My wife Maxine was very instrumental in formulating the Nina Rene Cosmetics, which has been successfully marketed to women of color. This product is currently being exported to Ghana, West Africa.

Upon my retirement from the the GTE Corporation, I worked as a consultant for International Wireless; a Boston based cellular telephone company which implemented cellular services in Africa. I was assigned to Abidjan, West Africa where I provided engineering support for the networking of cellular sites.

After my return from Africa, we established Motherland Import Gallery in 1997 and opened our first retail store in the Mall of Memphis, Memphis TN. We currently occupy a 4,000 sq. ft. retail facility at the Hickory Ridge Mall in Memphis TN where we feature furniture and home accessories imported from West Africa.

During year 2000 we constructed a 25,000 sq. ft. retail facility in Tunica Resorts, MS. We are currently leasing space to the Mississippi State Gaming Commission in addition to operating Museum de Sankofa, a non- profit 501(c)3 museum that focuses on the African slave trade, an African art gallery, and event center.
