INTRODUCTION

The Mississippi Department of Education (MDE) is committed to providing essential technical guidance and support mechanisms to assist districts during the time of extended school building closure as a result of COVID-19. The MDE recognizes and appreciates that districts are taking different approaches depending on their local capacity and infrastructure during this building closure. The State Board of Education (SBE) has provided flexibility within existing laws and policies regarding instructional time, graduation requirements, attendance, assessment and accountability.

In accordance with Governor Tate Reeves' Executive Order 1476, school districts shall operate with essential personnel to offer distance learning or other instructional means necessary for students to achieve completion of grade-level essential instruction for the 2019-2020 academic school year. Additionally, school districts shall submit to the SBE plans for summer learning and enrichment measures necessary to (a) mitigate disruption from the Spring 2020 school closure due to COVID-19 and (b) to enhance learning in preparation for the 2020-21 academic school year. Per Executive Order 1476, summer learning and enrichment measures are to be provided to all students in all schools.

The District Learning-at-Home and Summer Enrichment Plan is designed to ensure districts are taking deliberate and thoughtful actions to facilitate and individualize continued student learning and progress monitoring during closure.

Taking a traditional school environment online is not a simple task – nor is it one that should be attempted without serious consideration of the practicality and risk.

The MDE is not directing districts that they must transition to delivery of all content online, as we recognize that online access and remote support for rural students and students with disabilities will certainly pose equity issues across the state. Districts need to consider how they can help facilitate continued learning within homes across the state – either through online opportunities, by making grade-level instructional packets, Family Guides for Student Success, or other resources available for pick-up at school or various locations within the district, or through a combination of delivery systems.

In accordance with Executive Order 1476, describe how the district will provide students with feedback/grades on assignments completed during the extended school building closure and during summer learning and enrichment programs.

- The Marion County School District teachers will communicate through email, phone, Remind 101, Active Student/Parent, Social Media, and the Google platform. Teachers will keep extensive logs of student and parent contact.
- Student performance will be based upon grades earned in Term 1, Term 2, and Term 3. Due to COVID-19, students will receive full academic credit for Term 4.
- Grades will be calculated in SAM, the program presently used in MCSD to calculate grades under Policy IHA

- Promotion and retention will be determined according to Marion County School District Policy IHE.
- Extensive safety nets through our Tier process will be put into place for students who need remediation to reach grade/level course standards at the beginning of the 2020-2021 school year. The two distance learning-at-home packets completed during the 4th 9wks will be reviewed by teachers but will not be graded nor negatively impact the student's grade.
- An additional summer at-home learning packet/online resources will be targeted during the month of June and July with specific focus on essential skills for the upcoming school year. An emphasis on communicating the relevancy of the assignments and essential skills necessary for success during the upcoming school year will be strategically disseminated to parents and students across the summer.
- Students enrolled in a nine weeks course during the 4th term of the 2019-2020 school year that carries a Carnegie unit will need to complete a final exam through an open book test in order to satisfy requirements put in place by the Mississippi Department of Education. A passing grade on the exam will earn the student ½ Carnegie Unit.
- Credit recovery will be given immediately to any senior who needs course credits to graduate. Any student who failed a state tested course in the Fall of 2019 must be enrolled in credit recovery immediately. Any other credit recovery options must be approved by school administration and follow on-line credit recovery grading guidelines. Policies IDCAB/IDCA

These summer learning resources will be complemented by a cover letter to parents (both online and on take-home packets) that details the key power standards essential for the upcoming grade level in order for parents and students to make the connection between the activities and preparing to be successful in the upcoming year. While a specific schedule is not mandatory, a recommended schedule will be provided that promotes healthy study and learning habits while keeping students engrossed in a productive routine. Briefly describe how the district will monitor participation by students during the extended building closure and summer enrichment programs.

During both the current closure and across the summer Learning-At-Home and Enrichment program, the Marion County School District will continue to monitor students digital participation and performance through our digital platform Clever, as it houses all of our online distance learning programs.

As the MCSD will offer a blended program, highly qualified staff will be available for students and parents to contact via their regular methods of contact to answer any questions they may have as they progress through the learning-at-home and enrichment materials. The highly qualified staff have kept and will continue to keep daily logs of contact with students and parents.

At announced intervals, learning-at-home instructional materials will be collected and directed to each student's teacher for review in the determination of safety net programming needed for the upcoming year. These same safety net systems will be monitored for all online learning as well.

Students progress will be compared to the essential standards for each grade level they are entering and a growth intervention process will be put into place, including a grade-level skills screener and learning plan to help close any skills gaps due to the closure.

Credit Recovery will be available for any student who qualifies according to the MCSD Policy IDCAB/IDCA. Students will have full access to online programming that will target student/course specific skill sets.

Special education services will be provided to those students who meet criteria for ESY. Students will receive progress notes on the ESY goals at the end of the ESY program.

Transcripts and Senior Transitions SECTION F

District supports for graduating seniors may look different during an extended school building closure. High schools must ensure students have the necessary documents to continue their academic pursuits or transition into the work force.

Briefly describe how the district will ensure students receive transcripts and final grades upon graduation.

During the time of closure due to COVID-19 and in the days following the lifting of the shelter at home order, as directed by the Governor and MDE, all high school students have access to school counselors, principals, and district administrators via email or phone in order to secure transmission of official transcripts as needed. The Marion County School District will gradually reopen school buildings while continuing to follow CDC guidelines. As daily schedules change to reflect easing of CDC restrictions, updates will be provided to students and parents as stipulated below.

The Marion County School District will continue to communicate through email, phone call outs, Remind 101, Active Student/Parent, Social Media, the Marion County School District Website, as well as various other means to keep students abreast of any matriculation deadlines/updates, including transcript processing. As students transition to the next stage of their education/workforce, our staff remain committed to provide support and guidance to our students and alumni.
