Ideas for At Home Activities:

| Pretend & Learn | Gather small tools, tractors , vehicles, sticks to build fences, etc. Go outdoors with your child and participate in pretend play as your child builds a farm on a small area of land . Help your child build a tiny pond and add water. |
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| ABC | Write out the Concept Words on small pieces of paper or index cards. Then, write the first letter of each word on smaller cards. Talk about each word. Ask your child to match the correct letter cards to the first letters of the Concept Word cards. If available, magnetic letters or foam letters could be used. |
| Writing | Draw different shaped long lines: squiggly, straight, wavy, curvy, and zigzag onto a large piece of paper. Give your child a small tractor or other vehicle and allow your child to follow lines with the tractor. This is a pre-writing activity that strengthens your child's hand and finger muscles for future pencil holding/writing. |
| Math | With your child, discuss types of tools and how different tools help with different jobs. Walk around your house and have your child count the kinds of tools (kitchen tools, garage tools, garden tools, etc.). You and your child can write or draw types of tools and how many of each. |

| Science | Fill a large bowl, kiddie pool, or plastic tub with water. Collect a variety of items that sink and float. Make sure to collect items that are similar in size but different in how they will float or sink, like a rock and a tennis ball. Ask your child to predict whether the item will sink or float and let them drop it in the water. Ask, "Why do you think it sinks (floats)?" Have your child classify the items into two different stacks, the "floaters" and the "sinkers." |

| Art | Place a large piece of paper on a table or hard surface (even the driveway or sidewalk outside). Pour brown or black washable, child-safe paint in a puddle on the paper. Give your child a small tractor or other vehicle and allow the child to roll the tractor through the paint to make tracks on the paper. |
| Sensory | Make and play: Kool-Aid Playdough (see recipe below) |
| Building | Give your child empty toilet paper rolls, larger bottle caps (sports drinks), and other recyclable items. Encourage your child to build a tractor or other farm machine. Talk with your child about what machine was built and what it can be used for on a farm. |
| Social- Emotional Activity | Watch the "Did you know?" Mr. Rogers' Neighborhood series with your child. https://www.misterrogers.org/the-messages/ These videos help build your child's sense of wonderment, self-esteem, and independence. |

Kool-Aid Playdough

1 cup of flour

1 package of Kool-Aid

1/4 cup salt

2 Tbsp cream of tartar

1 cup warm water

2 Tbsp vegetable oil

Combine the dry ingredients in a saucepan and then stir in your warm water and oil. Stir in your saucepan on Medium heat for 3-5 minutes until the mixture forms a ball. Remove from heat and let cool. Knead the playdough and store in plastic bag in the refrigerator until ready to use.

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
